PUBLIC POLICY by Ann Mulligan

The New York State <u>Assembly</u> passed two progressive pieces of legislation: The Reproductive Health Act (RHA) and the Comprehensive Contraception Coverage Act (CCCA) which would safeguard access to abortion and contraception in New York State shielding New Yorkers from the dangerous effects of federal efforts to undermine reproductive rights. However, the State <u>Senate</u> has not. Call your state senator today and urge him to pass the RHA and CCCA.

LAF (LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND)

Susan Burhans was hired by Yale University in 1999 as a communications specialist and served the university as a security education coordinator. In 2012, Burhans filed suit against Yale, alleging sex discrimination and unlawful retaliation under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 and other laws. Burhans claims she was discriminated against and eventually terminated after years of attempting to help survivors of sexual assault on campus and alert Yale to potential Title IX violations. The suit was originally filed in 2012. Burhans filed an amended complaint in 2014.

THE WOMEN'S MARCH ON WASHINGTON, JANUARY 21, 2017

Member **Annmarie Uhl** sent her experience of this day.

"The day after the inauguration on January 20, 2017, will now be remembered as the day that women all over the world came together to have their voices heard. I had the opportunity to join with my fellow Rockland Women at the Women's March on Washington, D.C. Early in the morning, I stood shoulder to shoulder with women of all backgrounds washed in a sea of pink knitted hats. We stood in solidarity as we listened to the empowering speakers from all races, religions, and gender talk about the issues that we all must keep in mind and fight for the next four years.

As I stood on Independence Avenue and 7th Street, I met women from Boston who were here fighting for a women's right to comprehensive medical care which included the right to choose! I met two LGBT young men who were at the march to support women but also to recognize the rights of the LGBT community. Beside me stood a couple from Michigan who brought their young daughter. The mother was fighting for equality in the workplace so that her skills are valued just as much as her husband's skills.

The most powerful speaker for me was Gloria Steinem. She spoke about how over 40 years ago, she marched with her fellow women marchers for women's reproductive rights and equality. She said, "The time has come to put our bodies where our beliefs are." The crowd roared.

To the chant of, "THIS IS WHAT DEMOCRACY LOOKS LIKE," we took to the streets. With over 500,000 marchers, we peacefully spilled over the barricades and into the street. We marveled and talked about the protest signs that many marchers brought. They all represented in their own whimsical manner the reasons why the marchers came to DC that day. The message was loud and clear. We are here so that our voices are heard. We are here so that our issues as women are not marginalized. We are here with all our sisters of every race and creed to say we are not going to allow you to make decisions about our healthcare, our bodies, or our daughters.

The march in DC energized all that were there, but we know this is only the beginning. We need to stay focused on the issues that matter the most to us as women and as an organization. I will remember January 21, 2017, as the day I went to Washington, D.C., and my voice and my actions were heard!"

STEM

STEM continues to chug along at Summit Park Elementary School . We continue to acquire interested, talented coaches. Our number of coaches has exceeded 65. The students are having a wonderful time participating in the Art, Book, Chess and Knitting clubs.

We had a gratifying opportunity to supply a teacher's need. Tennis balls were needed for 28 chairs to reduce the noise level for a hearing-impaired student. A call to RSVP resulted in the immediate delivery of 106 balls. We still need 12 more to complete that class and we need 112 for a second class. They must be clean - only one use and *flat* is good. Balls can be delivered to the school at 925 Route 45 or to the RSVP office at Rockland Community College. You have no idea how happy the children were to receive them.

The Rockland Read-In on Friday, Feb. 10, at SPES was a complete success! Sorry you missed it. The children were there, the readers were there, delicious food was there. Blizzards don't stop the Diversity Brunch and the Nor'easter didn't stop the Rockland Read-In at Summit Park!

<u>Did you know</u> about <u>Matilda Joslyn Gage</u>? She was born in Cicero, NY in 1826. She received a liberal education and became a prolific writer in the cause of both abolition and women's rights. She co-authored with Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony the first three volumes of *A History of Woman Suffrage*. She also addressed her own concerns about male dominance within Christianity with the publication in 1893 of *Woman, Church and State*. Her efforts to document the historical 1848 Seneca Falls Convention resulted in her publication in her newspaper (*The National Citizen and Ballot Box*) of portions of *A History of Woman Suffrage*..as recorded by Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Gage was a hands-on activist, frequently attempting to vote, defending the rights of other intrepid women who dared approach the ballot box! She is primarily responsible for securing women the right to vote in school board elections!!! In 1880, she became the first woman to vote in Fayetteville under that law. While it would be several decades before women's voting rights became secure, we would be remiss if we didn't offer our homage and respect to this intrepid woman. Her lifelong mottoengraved on her cemetery grave stone is: *There is a word sweeter than "Mother," "Home" or" Heaven," that word is "Liberty."* COME TO THE NYS CONVENTION EARLY AND ENJOY HIGH TEA AND A TOUR OF THE MATILDA GAGE FOUNDATION.
