President's Message

On January 21, **2017**, I did not travel to Washington, D.C. or Manhattan to participate in one of the many women's marches planned around the country. I had already committed to attend a Founders' Day luncheon for my sorority, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. But the truth is I could have gone to a march afterwards as several of my friends did. But I was not interested. I wasn't sure that the march was truly connected to issues that mattered to me – pay equity, access to quality education, equal pay, addressing police brutality, and access to healthcare, to name just a few. I wasn't sure it spoke to me as a progressive woman of color interested in actions to address racism, patrimony, misogyny, and other societal and cultural ills.

Fast forward a year to January 20, **2018**, and I felt very differently. I was almost desperate to be surrounded by people, especially progressive women, who were as upset as I was by the constant bombardment of bad news – attacks on our civil liberties, a seeming escalation of senseless gun violence and mass murders, attacks on access to health care and reproductive healthcare, and our societal reckoning with a culture of male empowerment and privilege secured through sexual harassment and other forms of bullying and violence.

Yes, I really, truly needed a women's march. And for me it accomplished a number of things – it strengthened my connection with the advocacy organizations that were organizing around the march and I engaged in advocacy by sending letters to elected officials urging that they prioritize women's issues this legislative session. I interviewed an AAUW member attending the march that morning on my radio program ('City Watch' on WBAI 99.5 FM, Saturdays @ 10 AM), which had a special focus on the #WomensMarchNYC. Unable to connect with the friends I had planned to meet, I made new friends with a group of young women I met as I waited to march. And I had fun – it was a beautiful, albeit cold, day, and we were the beautiful mosaic that Martin Luther King had dreamed of...It was a very good day, indeed.

L.A.F. Update on *Janet Conney v. the Regents of the University of California* et al. Janet Conney claimed that she began experiencing a hostile work environment in 2001, after male colleagues made inappropriate comments about her and other women, including comments about their bodies. She also learned that men working in positions similar to hers were making 50 – 100% more than she was. She complained about the harassment and pay inequity and her position was subsequently terminated in 2002. Conney filed a claim in 2003, and LAF began supporting the case in 2004. After trial in 2004, she was awarded a total of \$2.95 million in damages. The university appealed, but in 2006, the California Supreme Court declined to contest the original verdict and awarded Conney an additional \$4.07 million.

Beverly Cooper Neufeld - Founder and President, PowHer New York (Keynote Speaker)

To address the slow progress on women's economic issues, Bev Neufeld envisioned PowHer New York: a community working across typical barriers to connect people, energize a movement, and accelerate progress. Ms. Neufeld is the President of BCN Consulting Group LLC, which helps nonprofits create change through advocacy, programming, and organizational development. As former President of the New York Women's Agenda, Beverly lead the campaign for pay equity reform, now a signature program of PowHer New York, which influenced the passage of the NYS Women's Equality Act and the NYS Equal Pay Act. Beverly is a member of the national Paycheck Fairness Taskforce and the steering committee of the 850 member, NYS Women's Equality Coalition.

As E.D. of the White House Project she oversaw research on women's leadership and helped develop SheSource and Vote, Run, Lead. Beverly was Finance Director for Congresswoman Nita Lowey. Her board service includes 2020 Women on Boards, Free the Children, Sing for Hope, Women's Campaign Forum, and Westchester Children's Association.
