March 15th was EQUAL PAY DAY...

Equal Pay Day marks the number of additional days that the average salaried woman must work to equal the average salary of white men in the previous year. The Equal Pay Day calendar according to AAUW.org is listed below...



- **Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Women's Equal Pay Day** is May 3. Asian American and Pacific Islander women are paid **75 cents for every dollar** paid to white men.
- Black Women's Equal Pay Day is September 21. Black women are paid 58 cents for every dollar paid to white
- Native Women's Equal Pay Day is November 30. Native women are paid 50 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
- Latina's Equal Pay Day is December 8. Latinas are paid 49 cents for every dollar paid to white men.

AAUW empowers all women and girls to reach their highest potential.

This month's Member Spotlight is on... Phyllis B. Frank



Phyllis is a long-time community leader in Rockland County, well known for her exemplary, trailblazing work confronting all forms of oppression. Even as a child, she was introduced to the idea of social justice by her family. Her passion for justice has been evolving throughout her life.

Her career has had a long and distinguished history. In 1979, as a staff member at VCS (Volunteer Counseling Service), Phyllis was asked to design a court-ordered program that would hold men accountable for intimate partner violence. It was the beginning of a new endeavor across the country and Phyllis was one of the pioneers. The brilliance and groundbreaking nature of her ideas was such that government officials, lawmakers, academics and practitioners began to seek her advice.

As Phyllis continued to think about the problems of men's violence against women, her clarity and courage led her more fully to an understanding of the problem as deeply rooted in sexism. In time, she began to consider how sexism was interconnected with other forms of oppression, most notably racism, heterosexism, and classism. She expanded her already broad range of activities to begin to challenge our community to confront these issues.

Phyllis began to energize hundreds of people in Rockland and surrounding counties to participate in a range of antiracism programs. Some years ago, she presented a film to the Rockland Community entitled 'The Color of Fear' which drew hundreds of people. The film enriched the conversations about race in our community. But Phyllis always believes there is more to learn.


She inaugurated the Gay Pride Rockland celebration which has changed the climate here for so many families. Most recently she has been educating the community on Transgender issues. She also co-facilitates monthly roundtables on racial and gender justice. There are hundreds of people who have never met Phyllis who are safer, walk taller, and live more fully because of her.

Phyllis was inducted into the Rockland Civil Rights Hall of Fame in 2013 and continues to work diligently for social justice, equity and equality in her current position as Chief Program Officer at the Center for Safety and Change. She will turn 80 years old this month! Zebrowski and State Senators, Elijah ReichlinMelnick and James Skoufis in March to
discuss the lobby agenda, composed of the
three (3) most urgent concerns decided upon

→) All meetings were productive and
pleasant and all of the officials assured us
that they were in agreement with our
positions and pledged support.

Follow-up from Skoufis and Lawler are forthcoming on Title IX Awareness in the County high schools and updated information on Maternal Morbidity and Mortality in Rockland County.

Legislative LOBBY Agenda - 2022

CHILD CARE ... commitment to create a high quality, culturally responsive, universal child care system within four years; phase-in of universal child care system to subsidized child care, address long standing inequities and the current staffing crisis. Child care is currently unaffordable for vast majority of families we want increase in number of families eligible for assistance. 65% of child care workers in the state must rely on public services to 'make ends meet' Child care workers' salaries should be comparable to public school teachers.



SALARY RANGE TRANSPARENCY... Wage Transparency - Pay Equity - Salary History Transparency The new pay transparency law makes it an "unlawful discriminatory practice" under the New York City Human Rights Law ("NYCHRL") for an employer to advertise a job, promotion, or transfer opportunity without stating the position's minimum and maximum salary in the advertisement. We'd like this to be established state-wide. N.B. IN ROCKLAND COUNTY, many positions listed on the civil service job listing page (https://mycivilservice.rocklandgov.com/prom) list salary as: "In accordance with the appropriate labor agreement". People applying for these positions are required to PAY FEES TO TAKE EXAMS FOR POSITIONS for the second of the contraction of the contract

ERA w/ new language ...

Passage/ ratification of this amendment and support of the Federal ERA is imperative. Thanks to Senators Skoufis and Reichlin-Melnick for co-sponsoring state amendment S-1268. And Title IX Coordinator in *every* secondary school in Rockland.







Inspiring Female Students at the College Level: An Interview with RCC's Dr. Katherine Lynch

Dr. Katherine Lynch became the Chair of the Sam Draper Honors Program at Rockland Community College in 2014. She is also a mentor and a teacher at the college. While at RCC, Dr. Lynch has realized that many female students "have imposter syndrome", which she describes as "really smart, intelligent, capable women who don't think that they belong in the honors program, or they don't think they belong at a great 4-year school."

In order to help her students' progress and succeed in their futures, Dr. Lynch works to provide her students with the mentorship and guidance, as well as "the skills and the tools to take the next step". She also works to reassure them and give them the confidence they need to believe in themselves and their own capabilities. By helping her students with their college essays, putting together applications, writing letters of recommendation, and helping them take the classes they need, Dr. Lynch has been able to help women find other colleges and communities that will support them and help them succeed, rather than push them down or belittle them.

Although Dr. Lynch identifies as non-binary and has adapted the pronouns "she/they" in order to further express her truest self, she continues to cherish the female aspect of her identity because it is a part of her and allows her to understand the world through a female perspective. Dr. Lynch said, "I think we need everybody who possibly wants to, supporting Women's History Month", because change cannot occur unless there is support from the majority. In the future, she hopes that women can learn to "become more collaborative and less competitive" in order to further progress in the workforce.
