This organization, in Rockland and Orange County has for 30 years, provided individual medical case management for people living with chronic conditions, nutritional counseling, and community support. The organization has distributed over 1 million tons of food and is accessing over 30 partner food pantries in Rockland County. You can go to touchny.org to learn about outreach as well as how you can help.



## This Month's Member Spotlight is on ... Maureen Brown



It's Black History Month 2023 and my mind's eye travels back to family and history. I feel a sense of joy in that my grandparents, great aunts, uncles and parents must have played an active part in the "First Great Migration" (including the Depression) here in Rockland during the mid to late 1920s. I am "a born in Rockland native"; raised by a nuclear family and a vast sea of extended family members which included long lists of 'other' moms and dads beyond the neighborhood. I learned to appreciate and treasure these life-long "other moms and dads", and close family friends. Countless valuable relationships and friendships were nurtured all throughout junior high and high school rivalries, sports or social events! Remembering the best places to meet up and see friends were at local 'teen happenings' like the popular Tiger's Den in Spring Valley, or those sticky warm evenings in Nyack for "Live Battle of the Bands" at Memorial Park, and dance parties at the first "Nyack Center" to name a few, a lot of night time fun but always "...inside by 11:00".

In prepping for this month's spotlight, I asked a few close friends who are sprinkled around the county to travel virtually with me on a Route 59 road trip. We "visited" McDermott's Ice Cream parlor, the movie theater on North Broadway in Nyack, the original Nanuet Mall, EJ Korvette's, Shopper's Paradise, the Nanuet Theatre Go-Round, and the county airport off of Smith Road in Nanuet. What a thrill to remember those prop planes that took to the sky and flew over the New York State Thruway!

At last, it was off to college for me. At S.C. State University (an HBCU) I earned a Bachelor's degree in Teacher Education, the Master's degree in Counseling followed after a long-awaited break from substitute teaching in the junior high school. I then found myself in the right place, at the right time and landed a graduate assistantship position in the busy Career Services Center on main campus. After finishing my studies, I returned home to search for and accept full time employment serving the county's developmentally challenged population. For a brief time, I made a career switch taking a stab at business and sales. However, I gravitated back to what I enjoyed the most, assisting others who wanted to help themselves progress. I accepted a grantfunded administrator level position at Rockland Community College as part of a team that provided structured academic and social programs to traditional aged students, returning adults, single parents and US service veterans. In addition to programming, I offered academic and financial advisement services, career and transfer services to students at the campus Student Services Center. I retired from Rockland Community College as a tenured Associate Professor.

Let me say "thank you" to my family elders for their "Great Migration" journey, their survival, and for paying it forward to the generations that followed. Present day family that now hail from all points and ports of the US are forever grateful for those that shared their journey.

As a current member of the Rockland County Branch of AAUW, I am an active participant on the program committee and the nominating committee. Kudos and thanks to long time member and former Branch President, Joyce Brown for introducing me to AAUW.




Albany – On Tuesday, January 24th, the State Senate and Assembly passed for the second time a proposed Equal Rights Amendment to the State Constitution. The amendment, <u>S.108/A.1283</u> sponsored by Senator Liz Krueger and Assembly Member Rebecca Seawright, will extend current constitutional protections against discrimination to several new protected classes, as well as protecting access to contraception and abortion. The Legislature first passed the measure in June 2022 after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade. Following today's second passage, the amendment will now go to voters for ratification in the November 2024 general election.

She demonstrates how Hamer's ideas remain salient for a new generation of activists committed to dismantling systems of oppression in the United States and across the globe. A blend of social commentary, biography and intellectual history, *Until I Am Free* is a manifesto for anyone committed to social justice. The book challenges us to listen to a working-poor and disabled Black woman activist and intellectual of the civil rights movement as we grapple with contemporary concerns around race, inequality and social justice.
